"I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!" - EARLY INTERVENTION INITIATIVE -

Reform Restore Respect launched its community-based project - "I Didn't Know That!" - in March 2012 after the charity's incorporation in February 2012. In response to feedback from Mid-Kent College Campus at City Way and Maidstone, in 2008 a Lecturer in Decorative Occupations wrote -

"As far as I am concerned if these guys come in and help just one, then it's one life that we have saved from going down the wrong road".

Another Instructor for Wood Occupation wrote -

"I thought that the prison talks were very good, very realistic and worthwhile for the students. My class felt that the prisoners told the true story and made the idea of prison not a nice place to end up, a real revelation!"

Early intervention approaches are notoriously difficult to measure and quantify, regardless of their impact, since they are based on the planting of ideas, different ways of thinking, alternative and credible approaches to youth-related problems such as negative peer pressure, self worth and self-image, etc. Indeed, we were delighted to see the work of Reform Restore Respect picking up many accolades in its relatively short life such as nationally being recognised in October 2013 through our CEO and Presenter, Francis Osei-Appiah, winning the publicly-voted, first ever 'No Offence!' National Inspirational Award for the charity's work with young people. The charity subsequently won another award in November 2013, locally voted by the public in Kent for the Heart of the Community Awards 2013. In November 2014, the charity was locally voted as one of the big winners for the Heart of the Community Awards 2014 for the 2nd consecutive year running. In May and June 2015, at the first ever Sevenoaks District Council Volunteers Awards - we won a certificate of achievement for **Charity Project of the Year** and subsequently at the North West Kent Crime Prevention Panel Community Safety Awards we won a certificate in recognition of **outstanding effort on enhancing community safety in Sevenoaks District**.

The charity continues to grow from strength to strength each year and its reputation and brand is well respected within Kent. We have been invited to BBC Southeast News and BBC Radio Kent on three separate occasions within the last year, speaking as expert commentator in our field of work and discussing many of the social issues which face young people in Kent. We are grateful for all of our supporters and partners who help promote our work publicly including also the Courier Newspaper and Sevenoaks District Council 'In-Shape Magazine which went to over 55,000 households and businesses within Sevenoaks District which was a huge marketing for our charity.

In May 2015, we sponsored activities for Pepenbury Group disabled service-users Open Fun Day from our Social Responsibility Unrestricted Funds generated from school fees per year in supporting a local good causes. The Pepenbury Group has historical relationship with HMP Blantyre House providing employment and volunteering projects for the prisoners. Needless to say, our founder and CEO is a testament to that legacy of Pepenbury Group providing employment to serving prisoners and ex-offenders.

At the time of writing, the 2014-2015 school year saw our cumulative total of Kent workshop attendees pass the **10,000** milestone in just 3.5 years, a commendable effort for a small charitable organisation. To date, **10,118** young people have seen our programme over the period February 2012 to August 2015. We closed the 2014-2015 school year having seen **2,695** young people in **60** venue visits, delivering **201** sessions which included Primary Schools with Year 6 'Transition' students, Secondary Schools, Community-based projects and Pupil Referral Units. This is up slightly on our 2013-2014 total of **2,265** workshop attendees.

As we continue to deliver our Anti-Crime Module, we have broadened our schools project workshops and services for young people to include other modules to meet some of the variety, requests and suggestions for some PSHCE topics in some schools in Kent. We launched our Anti-Bullying Module in Edenbridge Primary School in January 2015. We delivered our Anti-Prison Module to The North School in Ashford for the second consecutive year, delivering to A-level law and Social Sciences students. All of our workshops continue to be educative, informative and fit well into schools PSHCE agenda.

Our workshop continues to be suitable for delivery in PSHCE and Citizenship lessons for primary school Year 6 pupils before their 'transition' to secondary schools and Year 7 to 11 in secondary schools as well as sixth forms and colleges. The workshop can also be used as the basis for extra-curricular activities, focus days and multi agency 'carousel' days. More enlightened secondary schools are identifying the sheer cost effectiveness, both in human and financial terms, of early intervention measures such as those provided by Reform Restore Respect. Indeed, it is likely that Ofsted would welcome our input as a preventative measure, closely aligned to the PSHCE agenda. 'Investors in People' accreditation, which most schools have, would equally identify the positive step in our early intervention approach.

On December 03, 2014 our former Trustee-Director, Beth Griffin, resigned from the Board of Trustees due to growing work commitments and family commitment. We are extremely grateful to Beth for her considerable input into our work in the 34 months during which she was involved with us. Since Beth Griffin's resignation, we have been fortunate to have Ian Ross FRSA join our board and we give Ian Ross FRSA a warm welcome. Ian Ross FRSA had been acting in an advisory capacity since the charity's formation in 2012.

"I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!" - OBSERVATIONS AND THE FUTURE

Firstly, in just 3.5 years, as it was our 3rd anniversary as a charity on 22nd February 2015, **10,118** young people have seen our programme, a commendable effort by a small charity operating on a part-time basis. Our anti-crime initiative drew to a close in July 2015 for the school summer break. Our programme resume again in September 2015. Whilst the project continues to grow across Kent, we are achieving this in a more localised form. Reform Restore Respect has been successful in securing small, localised funding, considerably helped by the overwhelmingly positive responses which the charity has solicited from teaching staff and, more importantly, from the young people who have attended our workshops over the past 3.5 years.

We have been very grateful to a number of local people, funders and professionals that have supported us with physical help or grants. In particular The Tudor Trust, who continues to fund more than 50% of our core cost for 5 years. Without The Tudor Trust input, we could not have achieved what we have in nearly 3.5 years. Also, Kent Community Foundation Overstone Fund's generous one year grant. We have been very fortunate to receive funding and donations from Sevenoaks District Community Safety Partnership, The New School at West Heath and Kent Heart of the Community Awards 2014.

Moving forward, in 2015-2016 school academic year, we will continue to deliver our hard-hitting, anti-crime awareness workshops in schools and community groups to explain the often life long consequences of receiving a police caution, a criminal record and a prison term. We are always and continuing reviewing our module to provide simple, easy to understand information around young people's rights and responsibilities with regard to the law surrounding youth crime. Our objective are:

- Delivering our early intervention workshops in primary and secondary schools across Kent, intervening in all
 areas of disruptive and antisocial behaviour, in itself, often an early identifiable pathway into petty offending
 and, inevitably, a criminal record and a custodial sentence, both of which will cause untold devastation to the
 lives of young people, often with consequences reaching far into their adult lives.
- Delivering self-confidence and self-esteem building workshops surrounding anti-bullying and the increased prevalence of substance misuse amongst young people in general and 'legal highs' in particular, a growing trend, and also the consequences of using cannabis.

"THE NEW SCHOOL AT WESTHEATH PROJECT" - THE FUTURE

During the 2014-2015 school year, we were proud to continue supporting New School at West Heath with our services supporting their therapeutic department and their EOS (Education Off Site) programme. We delivered **127** sessions of 1-2-1 mentoring services to **23** different students between September 2014 to end of March 2015. During that time, the West Heath Project was based within the school setting whereby we work with students on a 1-2-1 individual basis around various issues affecting their adolescence such as behaviour, substance misuse, crime, courts, bullying, gangs, image, identity, weapons, knives, racism and diversity.

This project provided an important and vital area of work in helping the school to understand and get to the underlying causes of some of the problems and issues encountered by students in their daily lives, both inside and outside school, which has led to extra support in provision being provided for the students such a referrals to CAMHS - Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services - and Kent Council on Alcohol, a local service provider, helping with substance misuse support. We helped and supported the school in advisory role to the Senior Leadership Team in revising some of the school policies on drugs and the school criteria on new intake of students.

However, the out of hours workload of report writing and emotional pressures associated with the West Heath project led the board of trustees and the CEO severing all ties between the charity and the school by the end of March 2015. We will continue our working relationship with West Heath to offer and support them with assembly-style workshops just like any other school in Kent if they wish to book us.

"SEVENOAKS DISTRICT COUNCIL COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP PROJECT" - THE FUTURE

In May 2014, Sevenoaks District Council Community Safety Partnership invited us to reapply for a further 1-year grant to continue our project in Sevenoaks schools. In July 2014, we were pleased to learn that our bid had been successful. The grant was awarded to Reform Restore Respect to deliver workshops in schools in the district, to run community early intervention programmes and to complete home visits to a minimum of 200 young people in the Sevenoaks district. Such was the demand for our workshops that we saw 1,034 young people during the period in question with no additional cost to the council. In the September 2014 to August 2015 period of support, out of 46 schools within the District, we reached 13 schools, which meant that 27% of the District schools engaged and 1,034 young people attended our project, overachieving our original target of 200 young people per year by 834, a 417% uplift against projection. Cara Sillett has been invaluable in her efforts in contacting and engaging more schools than in the previous school year. The project has gone from strength to strength each year, reaching and engaging with even more schools. We delivered 29 sessions in total, including 16 workshops, 13 of those being 1-2-1 sessions around various issues affecting the attendees' adolescence such as substance misuse, crime, courts, bullying, gangs, image, identity, weapons and knives. We hope that the 13 schools who engaged with us this year will remain on board with us for repeat services each year, subject to successful fundraising and, in moving forward with the CSU from September 2015, we hope we can reach and engage the remaining 35 schools to also get them on board.

"LET'S STOP BULLYING TOGETHER TODAY!" ANTI BULLYING, EARLY INTERVENTION AWARENESS WORKSHOP- THE FUTURE

During the 2014-2015 school year, Edenbridge Primary School pupils received a special bespoke piloted workshop on consequences of bullying and criminal behaviour with the aim of educating pupils on how bullying can affect young people's lives. Councillor Michelle Lowe, Sevenoaks District Council cabinet member for children and young people said: "Bullying can be distressing and the fear of bullying just as worrying for young people and their parents. This is why we are committed to help ensuring the safety of all those who live in the district which is why we are supporting the work of Reform Restore Respect and these anti-bullying workshops."

We extended the piloted module to The Marsh Academy on 19th March 2015. We felt it was important to pilot in both mixed-gender Primary School and mixed-gender Secondary School to have a balance view from the young people on the impact of the workshop.

The student feedback received from the pilot launch was very positive and felt that the workshop made some considerable impact. Some of their comments were:

"It was really good. We learned lots of things about bullying"

"I think the workshop was really helpful for people who are bullied"

"I think that the workshop was really good and teaches bullies and people who were bullied good advice on what to do"

"My whole life I have been bullied and I am still bullied now but I have had bad experiences like for example, when I was in Year 5 I lived in London and 3 girls bullied me. I had a brand new headband that I loved and the bullies pinned me back and threw my headband into a muddy puddle. I cried my eyes out"



From September 2015, we will offer this anti-bullying module to the schools that have needs for it only.



We have analysed 134 feedback forms completed by students across 2 schools [both Primary and Secondary Schools] following our piloted anti-bullying workshops.




"I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!" - ANTI-CRIME, EARLY INTERVENTION SCHOOLS PROJECT ——

We have analysed 168 fully completed student feedback forms returned from the Sevenoaks District schools following our 'I Didn't Know That' anti-crime, early intervention workshops.
